RAMS KICKOFF 2018 CAMPAIGN AT UCI

Irvine, Calif. - The Los Angeles Rams return to Irvine for the organization's third-consecutive training camp on the University of California, Irvine campus.

The 2018 training camp schedule will feature 12 practices open to the public and one additional practice reserved for season ticket members.

Rookies report to UCI on Monday, July 23, and the remainder of the team will report to camp on Tuesday, July 24, with the first practice on Thursday, July 26 at 3:00 p.m.

This season, the Rams will once again do a joint practice with a preseason opponent. This season L.A. will travel across the country to partake in two joint practices hosted by the Baltimore Ravens at Under Armour Performance Center in advance of the teams' first preseason contest on Thur., Aug. 9.

New to Rams training camp this year is an expanded fan activation area, which will open two hours prior to every practice. This area will include a DJ, face painting, interactive photo experience presented by UNIFY, enter-to-win opportunities, a virtual reality gaming tent and more.

Also new this year, to attend any practice held on a Saturday or Sunday, fans must sign up in advance to redeem their free ticket, which will be used to redeem the giveaway (pending availability). Tickets can be redeemed here: www.therams.com/freetickets.

Fresh off an 11-5 season and the organization's first NFC West title since the 2003 season and first playoff berth since 2004, second-year Head Coach Sean McVay welcomes 33 new faces entering the 2018 season.

Of the 33 new faces, 12 are on the offensive side of the ball, while 21 new defenders joined the Rams this offseason. Offensively, four linemen, four wide receivers, two running backs, one tight end and one quarterback were added to the roster. Defensively, the Rams added eight defensive backs, seven defensive linemen and six linebackers to their roster.

Additionally, four coaches received elevated titles during the 2018 offseason, Aaron Kromer was promoted from offensive line coach to run game coordinator, Shane Waldron was promoted from tight ends coach to pass game coordinator, Zac Taylor was promoted from assistant wide receivers to quarterbacks coach and Ted Rath was promoted from head strength and conditioning coach to director of strength training and performance.

There were also four coaches added to the Rams' staff for the 2018 season, Liam Coen (assistant wide receivers), Matt Daniels (assistant special teams), Jedd Fisch (senior offensive assistant) and Dustin Woods (assistant strength and conditioning).

RAMS CREDENTIAL INFORMATION

The Rams media access policy has been carefully crafted to foster a positive relationship with all media in conjunction with the overall policies of the NFL. The ultimate goal of our team policy is to ensure a professional working environment, the delivery of accurate and timely information, and to accommodate the goals of the media and the team.

Only credential requests from accredited working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication will be reviewed. Credentials will not be issued to independent websites or freelancers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. Demand for credentials is high and as such, the size and legitimacy of each media outlet requesting access will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

The following will be considered when evaluating applications:

- Los Angeles-area media outlets that cover the team on a regular basis, year-round will receive top priority.
- Only television stations with regularly scheduled news programs that include news, sports and weather segments will be reviewed.
- Only radio stations with a 24-hour sports format and are affiliated with a national radio network (i.e. ESPN, CBS, Westwood One) will be reviewed.

TRAINING CAMP MEDIA POLICY

The following guidelines for all local, regional and national media covering the 2018 Los Angeles Rams Training Camp:

MEDIA CHECK-IN

Members of the media must check in with the Rams Communications Department upon their initial visit to training camp. Media check in is at the entrance to the practice field from parking lot 6.

TRAINING FACILITY ACCESS

All areas except for the media work room are off-limits to all members of the media unless accompanied or cleared by a member of the team's communications department. Live shots on team grounds are not permitted unless approved in advance by the team's communications department.

PRACTICE ACCESS

- Practice will be open to the public for training camp.
- Media must remain in the designated area at all times.
- Still photographers will be allowed to shoot the entire practice.
- Television cameras may shoot the stretching and individual periods of practice, approximately the first 20 minutes.
- No reporting on strategy, personnel groupings or trick plays. (Media may NOT record, discuss on air, blog, or publish: number of repetitions taken by any player; length of any practice; attire worn by players; various positions the players participated in; which players practiced or did not practice; conversations that take place on field between players and/or coaches).
- No cell phones or laptops are allowed on the grounds at any time once camp breaks.
- Only Coach McVay will discuss injuries with the media.

The Rams have a zero tolerance policy regarding the above procedures

HEAD COACH SEAN MCVAY

During training camp, Coach McVay will be available to the media on the field following the conclusion of each open practice unless otherwise stated by the communications department.

COORDINATORS & ASSISTANT COACHES

Run Game Coordinator Aaron Kromer, Pass Game Coordinator Shane Waldron, Defensive Coordinator Wade Phillips and Special Teams Coordinator John Fassel will be available periodically post-practice, as scheduled by the head coach.

GENERAL MANAGER & OTHER STAFF

General Manager Les Snead will be available at select times. All requests must be made through the team's communications department. No other member of the football operations staff will be available unless approved in advance by Senior Director of Communications Artis Twyman. Calls or other contacts made directly to staff members' offices will be referred to the communications department.

PLAYERS

- Player requests should be submitted to the team's communications department in advance whenever possible.
- The locker room will be closed to all media during training camp.
- Players are not available until all their responsibilities (i.e. lifting, position meetings, etc.) for that time period are completed.
- Players will not be available at any time when they are in the team facility except during regularly scheduled media access periods.
- Players are available after preseason games in the locker room.
- Media are respectfully asked not to call players, football personnel, or coaches on their own. The team requests that you respect the media policy and contact the communications department for every attempt to be put in contact with a player.
- All players will be encouraged by the team to accommodate all interviews. However, the player does have the right to decline.

FAN INFORMATION

FAN ENTRANCE

New to Rams training camp this year is an expanded fan activation area, which will open two hours prior to every practice. This area will include a D.J., face painting, interactive photo experience presented by UNIFY, enter-to-win opportunities, a virtual reality gaming tent and more.

DEDICATED KIDS ZONE

The Rams Kids Zone will include inflatables, vertical jump, plinko, a sign making station and an opportunity to capture fan photos presented by 24 Hour Fitness.

BEER GARDEN

With an expanded footprint, fans who are 21 or older will be able to enjoy a cold beverage before and during practice. The beer garden is located at the north end of practice field.

FAN TUNNEL

Returning this year, fans will have the opportunity to form a Fan Tunnel when the players take the field for practice. Each practice, 20 fans along with a guest of their choosing will be selected to form the tunnel. SHADED SEATING

All bleacher areas will be shaded. Seats will be occupied on a first-come, first-serve basis, so fans are encouraged to arrive early.

TRAINING CAMP FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Are all training camp practices open to the public?

The Los Angeles Rams 2018 Training Camp will feature 12 practices at UCI that are open to the public and one practice that is open only to select season ticket members.

Does the practice schedule change?

The practice schedule can change. Weather and field conditions are evaluated daily. Practice times are subject to change without notice. Please visit www.therams.com/trainingcamp for any practice updates.

Is there a charge to see any of the practices?

There is no charge for fans to attend any of the open training camp practices. Fans will need to purchase parking. Please see below for parking rates.

What time should I arrive to watch practice?

Gates open 90 minutes before practice begins.

Where will fans park during training camp?

Parking will be available to fans in the Mesa Parking Structure (next to the Bren Events Center).

Fans are encouraged to purchase parking passes at a discounted rate of \$10 per car online at: <https://www.parking.uci.edu/rams/parkingpasses.cfm>

Parking passes purchased in-person on the day of practice will cost \$15 per car.

Where do fans with disabilities park?

Rams fans do not need to make advance arrangements with UCI Transportation for disabled parking or mobility assistance. Vehicles with handicapped placards or license plates will be automatically directed to the designated reserved parking areas.

UCI Transportation also is pleased to provide special assistance to those individuals with accessibility needs. Once you've parked your vehicle, please notify a UCI Transportation staff member if you need assistance to Crawford Sports Complex. Our cart drivers will shuttle you to and from the Bren Events Center turnout. This service is limited to the disabled/mobility impaired individual and one family member.

Are backpacks and bags allowed at practice?

For the safety and enjoyment of all fans attending Rams practice, only small bags will be permitted during open training camp practices at UCI. All persons and/or bags may be subject to inspection.

Prohibited items include, but are not limited to: purses larger than a clutch bag, coolers, briefcases, backpacks, fanny packs, cinch bags, luggage of any kind, seat cushions, computer bags and camera bags or any bag larger than the permissible size.

Will fans be able to get autographs?

All kids (ages 5-14) who visit the Rams Kids Club tent in the Fan Zone have an opportunity to be selected for one of two memorable experiences. Parents or guardians may sign up their kids for a chance to be selected for the post-practice autographs. Autograph sessions are subject to change without notice due to weather or football-related matters. Please be polite when you ask for autographs.

What should I bring to training camp?

For your comfort, please feel free to bring the following items to training camp: hats, jackets, rain gear, sunglasses, sunscreen, binoculars, umbrellas, and strollers.

The following items will not be permitted at training camp: outside alcohol, outside food and beverage, coolers, glass containers, noise makers, loud radios, large signs or inappropriate attire. Also, no weapons of any kind, regardless of persons with concealed carry handgun permits, will be allowed.

May I bring my camera to training camp?

Yes. Feel free to bring your camera to take photos of players and coaches. Flash photography is not allowed. Video cameras will not be allowed.

May I bring a cooler or food to training camp?

No coolers or outside food and beverage, including alcohol, are permitted.

Will there be seating at training camp?

Limited bleacher seating for fans will be provided around the practice fields. This year, there will be select bleachers that will be shaded, they are available on a first come, first served basis.

Are pets allowed at practice?

Animals are not allowed due to the size of the crowd and safety concerns. The only exception is service animals for those with disabilities.

Can I purchase merchandise at training camp?

Fans may purchase authentic Rams merchandise at training camp near the fan entrance. In addition, a large merchandise trailer will be available in the Rams Fan Activation Area.

Will concessions be available at training camp?

UCI Hospitality and Dining will provide concessions at the far end of the field in the Fan Activation Area. There will be sodas, candy, hotdogs, nachos and more. A training camp menu can be found on www.therams.com/trainingcamp. The 2018 training camp is a beer garden for those who wish to cool off with an adult beverage.

What will be available in the Fan Activation Area?

New to Rams training camp this year is an expanded fan activation area, which will open two hours prior to every practice. Gates to practice will open 90 minutes before and select players will sign autographs after all open practices.

Each day is open to the public, except for Friday, July 27, which will be a private practice for Rams Season Ticket Members and SSL Holders. Please note, all season ticket members will be contacted directly.

Join us on Saturday, July 28 for our 'Opening Weekend Kickoff Festival' beginning at 1 p.m. The day will include games, music, appearances from Rams Legends, Cheerleaders, Rampage and more!

LOS ANGELES RAMS PROJECTED STARTERS



OFFENSE

WR Cooper Kupp – During the 2017 regular season, led the team in receiving yards (869) and ranked second in receptions (62). Scored his first professional touchdown in Week 1 by way of an 18-yard pass from QB Jared Goff. Totalled five receiving touchdowns in his rookie season. Posted first-career 100-plus receiving yard game with 116 yards receiving in a 26-20 win over New Orleans in a Week 12 contest. Played in the Wild Card game against the Falcons, hauling in eight receptions for 69 yards and a touchdown. Kupp is the first Rams rookie in franchise history to catch eight passes in a postseason game.

TE Tyler Higbee – Played in 32 career regular season games with 23 starts, including all 16 regular season contests of the 2017 regular season. Recorded 25 receptions for 295 yards and a touchdown a season ago. Posted a career-best 98 yards receiving on four receptions against the Seahawks in a Week 5 contest.

LT Andrew Whitworth – 13th-year pro has started 179-of-183 career regular season games played and started all seven postseason games he has played in. Helped provide time for Goff to throw for a career-best 146.8 QB rating in Week 9 51-17 win at the New York Giants. Voted a team captain by his peers in his first season with the Rams. Named to his fourth-career Pro Bowl following the 2017 campaign.

LG Rodger Saffold – Ninth-year pro has started 95-of-98 career regular season games played, including 15 games of the 2017 campaign at LG. Has started at four different positions in 95 career starts - 39 at LG, 38 at LT, 13 at RG, and five at RT. Made his postseason debut starting at LG in the Wild Card round against Atlanta, blocking for Gurley to rush for 101 yards, first Rams running back to notch a 100-plus yard game in his postseason debut since Jim Gillette had 17 carries for 101 yards vs. Washington (12/16/45).

C John Sullivan – Started 109-of-137 career regular season games played, all at the center position. Helped provide a pocket for QB Jared Goff to throw for a career-best 355 yards in Week 10 win over Houston. Paved the way for RB Todd Gurley II to amass 2,093 yards from scrimmage through 15 games played. Has appeared in five playoff games with four starts, including the Wild Card game versus Atlanta.

RG Jamon Brown – A third-round selection (No. 72 overall) by the Rams in the 2015 NFL Draft. Started 30-of-36 career regular season games played, primarily at RG, including all 16 contests of the 2017 campaign. Started the Rams Wild Card contest against the Falcons. According to Pro Football Focus, was the only Rams player in 2017 to play over 1,000 snaps, leading the team with 1,031 snaps played, 99.81% of the team's offensive plays.

RT Rob Havenstein – Fourth-year pro, started all 43 career regular season games played and the 2017 Wild Card contest, has committed only 10 penalties in 43 games. A second-round selection (No. 57 overall) by the Rams in the 2015 NFL Draft. Provided blocking for RB Todd Gurley II to rush for 101 yards, first Rams running back to notch a 100-plus yard game in his postseason debut since Jim Gillette had 17 carries for 101 yards vs. Washington (12/16/45).

WR Brandin Cooks – Acquired by the Rams via a trade that sent the Rams 2018 first-round pick to the Patriots. Signed a five-year contract extension prior to reporting to training camp. Fifth-year pro has played in 58 regular season games with 46 starts. Posted at least 1,000 yards receiving in each of the last three seasons. Recorded 280 career receptions for 2,943 yards and 27 touchdowns. Averages 14.1 yards per reception with a 98-yard touchdown as his longest reception. Has nine 100-plus yard receiving games with a career-best 186 yards coming against the Arizona Cardinals in 2016 when Cooks played with the Saints.

WR Robert Woods – The USC product has played in 69 regular season games with 59 starts through the 2017 regular season and started his lone playoff game. Established a career-best 171 yards receiving vs. Houston in a week 10 win. Totalled 56 catches for a 781 yards through 12 games played last season. Led the team in receptions (nine) and receiving yards (142) against the Falcons in the NFC Wild Card game. Woods' 142 receiving yards are the fourth-highest output in a single postseason game in Rams history and is the fourth receiver in franchise history to post 100-plus receiving yards in their postseason debut with the Rams.

QB Jared Goff – Started all 22 regular season games he has played in as a professional and his first playoff contest. During the 2017 regular season, completed 296-of-477 passing attempts with 28 touchdowns, seven interceptions and a 100.5 QB rating. Established a career-best 355 yards passing vs. Houston in Week 10 win and a career-high 146.8 QB rating in Week 9 win at New York Giants, a game in which he averaged 22.2 yards per completion. Completed 24-of-45 passes for 259 yards and one touchdown, the 45 pass attempts is tied for the second-most in postseason history with Kurt Warner, vs. Tennessee (1/30/00 - SB XXXIV) and Jim Everett, at Minnesota (12/26/88).

RB Todd Gurley II – Posted 2,093 yards from scrimmage in 15 regular season games this season and 19 total touchdowns in 2017, both are single-season career bests. Recorded 279 rushing attempts for 1,305 yards (4.7 yards/rush) with 13 rushing touchdowns. Led the team with 64 receptions for 788 yards (second-highest total on the team) and six receiving touchdowns. Named the NFC Offensive Player of the Month for September and December and named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for the team's Week 4 win at Dallas and Week 15 win at Seattle. Rushed 14 times for 101 yards, in his playoff debut against Atlanta, becoming the first Rams running back to notch a 100-plus yard game in his postseason debut since Jim Gillette had 17 carries for 101 yards vs. Washington (12/16/45).

KEY CONTRIBUTOR

TE Gerald Everett – Second-year pro has played in all 16 regular season games and one playoff contest with two regular season starts. Hauled in 16 receptions for 244 yards and two touchdowns as a rookie in 2017. Averaged 15.3 yards per reception, with his longest reception netting 69 yards. Tallied one rushing attempt for a 13-yard gain.

DEFENSE

DE Michael Brockers – The seventh-year pro started 89-of-91 career regular season games played. Led all Rams defensive linemen with 65 tackles, including 41 solo stops, eight tackles for a loss, 4.5 sacks and four passes defended during the 2017 regular season. The LSU product has 19.0 career sacks, eight passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Started his playoff debut, a Wild Card contest against the Falcons. Recorded 0.5 sack in 2017 Wild Card contest, a sack split with DT Aaron Donald.

NT Ndamukong Suh – Ninth-year pro has started all 126 career games played, including all 16 regular season games over the last six seasons. Totalled 51.5 career-sacks resulting in 339 yards lost. Joined the Rams as a free agent during the 2018 offseason. A five-time Pro Bowler, has been named first-team All-Pro three times and second-team All-Pro twice. Recorded seven multi-sack games, including five games with 2.0 sacks, most recently against the Texans in 2015, as a member of the Dolphins organization.

DT Aaron Donald – Four-time Pro Bowler has started 58-of-62 regular season games played. Recorded 52 tackles including 31 solo and 16 tackles for a loss, a team-best 11.0 sacks and five forced fumbles during the 2017 regular season. In the team's Week 3 contest, his second game of the season, corralled 49ers QB Brian Hoyer for a game-clinching sack. Tallied at least 1.0 sack in seven of the team's last 10 games. Matched a career-best 3.0 sacks in Week 15 win over Seattle. Started the team's Wild Card contest against Atlanta, posted five tackles, 0.5 sack, one tackle for loss and one QB hit in postseason debut.

OLB Samson Ebukam – Second-year pro out of Eastern Washington played in all 16 regular season games with two starts in 2017. Tallied 38 tackles during the regular season, including 18 solo stops and 2.0 sacks and one forced fumble. First-career sack came in a Week 10 win over Houston. Appeared in the 2017 Wild Card contest against the Falcons, finishing with one tackle.

OLB Matt Longacre – Fourth-year pro has played in 25 games with one start entering the 2018 season. Recorded a career-best 5.5 sacks in 14 games played a season ago. Tallied 15 QB hurries, eight tackles for loss, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery in his career.

LB Cory Littleton – Third-year pro has played in all 32 regular season games and one playoff game since joining the team as an undrafted free agent following the 2016 NFL Draft. Earned five career starts, including four during the 2017 campaign. Tallied four passes defended, three quarterback hurries, two tackles for loss, one forced fumble, one interception and 1.0 sack.

LB Mark Barron – Seventh-year pro out of Alabama started 81-of-92 career regular season games played. Ranked second on the team with 108 total tackles including a team-high 80 solo stops during the regular season. Transitioned for a pure safety to a hybrid linebacker role, before settling in as a true linebacker under Defensive Coordinator Wade Phillips' 3-4 defense. In the team's Week 5 contest with the Seahawks, registered a team-high 18 total tackles. Was one-of-two Rams defenders to record at least 10 tackles in 2017 Wild Card game against Atlanta, finishing second with 10 total tackles in his playoff debut.

CB Aqib Talib – 11th-year professional, acquired via trade during 2018 offseason. Played in 135 regular season games with 121 starts. Recorded a 103-yard interception returned for a touchdown in 2017. Has 10 career pick-sixes, two short of matching the all-time NFL record for interceptions returned for touchdowns (12) set by Rod Woodson. Started all eight postseason games he has appeared in, including Super Bowl 50, as a member of the Denver Broncos playing for Rams Defensive Coordinator Wade Phillips. Five-time Pro Bowler, most recently following the 2016 season.

CB Marcus Peters – Fourth-year pro joined the Rams via a trade with the Kansas City Chiefs in the 2018 offseason. A 2016 First-Team All-Pro was the No. 18 overall selection in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Chiefs out of Washington. Since entering the league in 2015, has recorded 19 interceptions, most in the NFL during that span. Started all 45 career games played, including 14 last season. Named to consecutive Pro Bowls following the 2015 and 2016 seasons.

FS Lamarcus Joyner – Tallied first-career INT and returned it 29 yards for a TD in Week 1 win over the Colts. Recorded 61 total tackles during the 2017 campaign, including 32 solo tackles, seven passes defended and one forced fumble. Tied for a team-best three interceptions in 12 games played during the regular season. Led the team with 11 total tackles, including 10 solo stops in his playoff debut against the Falcons.

SS John Johnson III – Second-year pro out of Boston College played in all 16 regular season games for the Rams with 11 starts during the 2017 season. Earned first-career start in team's Week 5 game against the Seahawks, recorded first-career interception and returned it 69 yards setting up a FG. Recorded 87 total tackles on the season, including 51 solo stops and 11 passes defended on the season. Posted a team-high 13 total tackles in Week 14 loss to Philadelphia. Started Wild Card contest against Atlanta and finished with six total tackles.

KEY CONTRIBUTORS

CB Nickell Robey-Coleman – Fifth-year CB earned first start as a Ram in a Week 2 contest. Tallied two tackles and one pass defended in his L.A. debut. Registered 50 total tackles, including 36 solo with two interceptions and nine passes defended during the 2017 regular season. Played in 79 career games with 19 starts in his career. Posted five career interceptions and two returned for touchdowns. Played in his first playoff game against the Falcons, tallied three tackles and one pass defended in postseason action.

DL Ethan Westbrooks – Fifth-year professional has played in 51 career regular season games with 11 starts, including nine starts during the 2017 regular season. Posted 28 tackles, including 16 solo, seven tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, five quarterback hits and one pass defended a season. Started his first-career playoff game against Atlanta, recorded three total tackles in playoff debut.

THE McVAY FILE



On January 12, 2017, Los Angeles Rams Owner/ Chairman E. Stanley Kroenke named Sean McVay the 23rd full-time head coach in franchise history. McVay became the youngest coach in modern NFL history.

In his first season guiding the Rams, McVay completed one of the greatest offensive turnarounds in NFL history. He helped the Rams move from the 32nd-ranked scoring offense in 2016 to the league's top-scoring team in 2017, marking the first time in league history a team has gone from last to first in scoring. The first-year head coach led the Rams to an 11-5 record and their first NFC West title since the 2003 season, earning the team's first playoff berth since 2004.

Following his first season in L.A., McVay was named *The Associated Press* Coach of the Year, becoming the youngest head coach to ever win the award. RB Todd Gurley II brought home Offensive Player of the Year honors, while DT Aaron Donald was named the Defensive Player of the Year, marking the first time in the 45 year history of the awards there was a sweep of three of the league's top awards. The Rams placed eight players in the 2018 Pro Bowl, the most in a single season by the franchise since the 1999 campaign.

Under McVay's guidance in 2017, second-year QB Jared Goff flourished. Goff completed 296-of-477 (62.1 percent) of his passes for 3,804 yards with 28 touchdowns and seven interceptions posting a 100.5 QB rating on the season. Gurley led the league in scrimmage yards finishing the year with 2,093 yards, including 1,305 rushing yards and 788 receiving yards. Additionally, Gurley was the league's highest scoring non-kicker posting 19 total touchdowns on the season.

The Rams defense posted the fourth-most sacks (48.0), tied for sixth in interceptions (18) and finished the 2017 campaign fifth in total takeaways with 28 on the season. The 28 takeaways directly resulted in 126 points for L.A., the second-best total in the NFL.

In his first season as head coach, the Rams special teams unit played an integral part in the team's success and was rewarded with a total of four special teamers being named to the Pro Bowl. The L.A. special teams unit was a top-10 finisher in 18 of the 22 statistical categories in the 2017 special-teams rankings.

Before joining the Rams, McVay completed his third season as the Redskins' offensive coordinator in 2016 after initially being promoted to the position on January 15, 2014. Prior to his promotion during the 2014 offseason, McVay spent three seasons as the team's tight ends coach (2011-13) and one as an offensive assistant (2010).

The 2016 Redskins' offensive unit broke many franchise records and ranked in the top-three in a number of statistical categories. The Washington offense became the first unit in franchise history to average over 400 yards per game (403.4) and notched a franchise record 6,545 total net yards.

Quarterback Kirk Cousins finished the year with single-season team records in completions (406) and passing yards (4,917) and matched his team record for 300-yard passing games (seven). His 4,917 passing yards ranked third in the NFL in 2016 and are the 15th-most in a season in NFL history. Cousins closed out the season ranked second in the NFL in passing yards per game (297.4), passing yards per play (7.84) and yards per play (6.4), in addition to being the league's third ranked offensive team, averaging 403.4 yards per game.

From 2015-16, Cousins threw for 9,083 yards, the fourth highest output by a quarterback trailing only Drew Brees (10,078), Matt Ryan (9,535) and Philip Rivers (9,178).

The Redskins offense had eight players finish the season with at least 500 yards from scrimmage (DeSean Jackson, Pierre Garcon, Jamison Crowder, Rob Kelley, Chris Thompson, Jordan Reed, Vernon Davis and Matt Jones), tying the 2011 New Orleans Saints for the most in a single season in NFL history.

McVay's group posted a breakout campaign in his second year as offensive coordinator in 2015, including record-setting performances by quarterback Kirk Cousins and tight end Jordan Reed. McVay's scheme and tutelage helped Cousins break Redskins records for attempts (543),

completions (379), passing yards (4,166) and 300- yard passing games (seven) in a single season. Reed has been a direct beneficiary of McVay's work, spending 2013 as a member of his unit during McVay's time as tight ends coach and being a focal point of the offense in 2015, as Reed recorded 87 receptions for 952 yards (both team records for a tight end) with 11 receiving touchdowns (one shy of the team record) in 2015.

Collectively, McVay's 2015 offense recorded Top 10 rankings in third down percentage (43.5, fifth in the NFL), red zone scoring percentage (61.2, eighth), yards per play (5.6, 10th) and points per game (24.3, 10th). The Redskins also led the NFL with a team-record 69.5 completion percentage in 2015, leading the league in the category for the 11th time in team history and the first time since 1970.



In his first season as offensive coordinator in 2014, McVay helped the offense to a Top 10 league ranking in yards per play (5.7) despite starting three different quarterbacks. His work with the three passers was instrumental in setting a team record for completion percentage (66.5 percent, later broken in 2015) and helping facilitate the explosive debut season of wide receiver DeSean Jackson. Jackson averaged a league-best 20.9 yards per reception and became only the fourth player in team history to lead the NFL in that category.

In 2013, McVay played a crucial role in Reed's development, as the then-rookie compiled 45 receptions for 499 yards – both Redskins' single-season rookie tight end records – despite Reed playing in only nine games. Under McVay's tutelage, Reed joined Chris Cooley (2004) as the only Redskins tight ends named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team. In addition, McVay helped tight end Logan Paulsen from an undrafted free agent into a 30-game starter from 2010-13, with Paulsen increasing his reception total each season.

During Washington's NFC East championship season in 2012, McVay's unit was productive despite losing starting tight end Fred Davis to a torn Achilles tendon in Week 7. Davis had led the team in both receptions (24) and receiving yards (325) through seven games before being placed on the reserve/injured list.

In 2011, McVay played an integral role in Davis' emergence, as the then fourth-year tight end surpassed his previous career highs despite playing in only 12 games. Davis caught 59 passes for 796 yards, the second-highest total on the team in both categories. Before missing the final four games of the season, Davis was on pace to set a franchise record in receiving yards by a tight end and was on pace to post the first 1,000-yard receiving season by a tight end in Redskins' history.

McVay served as an offensive assistant to the Redskins in 2010 in addition to working with the tight ends during the final four weeks of the season following coach Jon Embree's departure. The Redskins offense ranked eighth in the NFL in passing yards per game (244.6) and tight end Chris Cooley ranked second among NFL tight ends in receptions (77) and third in receiving yards (849). The offensive unit also set a franchise record for completions in a season (349), and registered a touchdown pass in 15 consecutive games for the first time in team history.

McVay joined the Redskins prior to the 2010 season after an undefeated regular season with the Florida Tuskers of the United Football League (UFL). The Tuskers finished a perfect 6-0 before losing in the UFL's inaugural championship game. McVay originally entered the National Football League as an offensive assistant with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2008.

During his time in Tampa Bay, McVay worked closely with wide receiver Antonio Bryant, who recorded career highs in receptions (83), receiving yards (1,248), and touch-downs (seven), en route to winning The Sporting News Comeback Player of the Year Award.

McVay graduated from Miami University (Ohio) where he played wide receiver from 2004-07, earning Miami's Scholar-Athlete Award in 2007. His grandfather, John, served in various roles – including vice president/director of football operations from 1983-94 – for the San Francisco 49ers from 1979-95, overseeing five Super Bowl championship squads and earning induction into the 49ers Hall of Fame in 2013.

COORDINATORS' CORNER



RUN AND PASS GAME COORDINATORS

Aaron Kromer, Run Game Coordinator: Aaron Kromer begins his second season with the Los Angeles Rams, his first season serving as the team's run game coordinator.

In his first season with the Rams, Kromer served as the offensive line coach overseeing the most stable offensive line unit in the NFL during the 2017 season. With the help of Kromer and the offensive coaching staff, the Rams improved from the 32nd ranked scoring team in 2016 to the league's top-scoring team in 2017.

Under Kromer's guidance, the offensive line blocked for RB Todd Gurley II, who was named The Associated Press Offensive Player of the Year after leading the league in scrimmage yards (2,093) and total touchdowns (19).

A veteran of more than 17 years as an offensive line coach, Kromer came to Los Angeles prior to the 2017 season after serving the past two seasons in the same capacity with the Buffalo Bills. In his 18 years as an NFL offensive line coach or coordinator, Kromer has helped 16 players earn a total of 23 Pro Bowl appearances.

Shane Waldron, Pass Game Coordinator: Waldron is entering his seventh NFL season, second with the Los Angeles Rams and his first season serving as the team's passing game coordinator.

Under Waldron's guidance in 2017, the tight end duo of Tyler Higbee and Gerald Everett combined for 539 yards, three touchdowns and averaged 13.1 yards per reception. Everett recorded a 69-yard reception in his second game as a professional which tied for the second-longest reception by a tight end during the 2017 season.

Previously, Waldron served as the Washington Redskins offensive quality control coach for the 2016 season. That season, Washington's offense broke the franchise record for total net yards in a single season (6,454), surpassing the previous team record set in 1989.

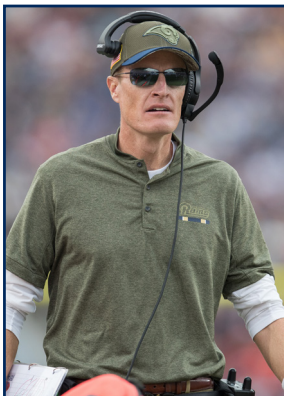
FASSEL'S FLYERS

The Rams have developed a reputation for delivering the unexpected in the kicking game, and special teams coordinator John Fassel is at the helm of the trickery that has helped the Rams become one of the NFL's best when it comes to special teams.

In 2017, the special teams unit played an integral part in the Rams success and was rewarded with a total of four special teamers being named to the Pro Bowl in PR/KR: Pharoh Cooper, P Johnny Hekker, LS Jake McQuaide and K Greg Zuerlein. Zuerlein led the league in scoring (158 points), despite playing in only 14 games before being placed on season-ending injured reserved.

The Rams special teams unit was a top-10 finisher in 18 of the 22 statistical categories in the 2017 special-teams rankings. There were only 11 punts blocked league-wide on the season, and the Rams had three of them. Cory Littleton was the only player in the NFL to block two punts. In total, the Rams blocked a total of five kicks in 2017.

In addition to his special teams duties, Fassel served as Interim Head Coach for the final three games of the 2016 season.

PHILLIPS' PHILOSOPHIES

Wade Phillips, who is in his 49th year of coaching, enters his second season with the Rams as defensive coordinator on Head Coach Sean McVay's staff.

A veteran coach entering his 41st NFL season, Phillips owns 36 years of experience as a defensive coordinator or head coach. Phillips continued his streak of helping teams to the playoffs in his first season with the organization when the Rams clinched the NFC West, marking the eighth-straight team that has made the postseason in Phillips' first year with the organization.

In his first season with the Rams in 2017, he guided a defense that finished fourth in sacks (48.0), tied for sixth in interceptions (18) and finished fifth in total takeaways with 28 on the season. The 28 takeaways directly resulted in 126 points for L.A., the second-best total in the NFL.

DT Aaron Donald was named AP Defensive Player of the Year for his efforts, becoming the first player in Rams history to ever earn DPOY. In 2017, Donald racked up 52 tackles, 31 solo (according to coaches' stats), 11.0 sacks for 95 yards, five forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and two passes defended, despite playing in only 14 games. Donald had team highs in sacks (11.0), quarterback hits (27) and forced fumbles (5).

Prior to joining the Rams, Phillips served as defensive coordinator for the Denver Broncos (2015-16), which was his second stint with the club after serving the same role from 1989-92, and also as head coach from 1993-94.

Phillips has been a part of 21 different top-10 defensive units during his NFL career and has coached a total of 31 Pro Bowlers. He is one of three individuals in NFL history to be named Assistant Coach of the Year multiple times by the Pro Football Writers of America, being honored with that distinction in 2011 with Houston and in 2015 with Denver. Phillips also received the Paul "Dr. Z" Zimmerman Award from the PFWA in 2016 (lifetime achievement as an NFL assistant coach).

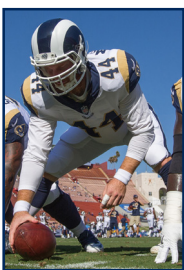

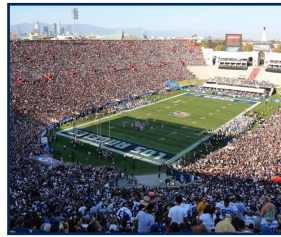

Los Angeles has a regular season record of 146-85-8 in games played at the Coliseum. Los Angeles also hosted 10 playoff contests at the Coliseum.

Los Angeles went 7-0 at home twice in its first 34 seasons in the Coliseum, during the 1973 and 1977 seasons.

FRESH FACES

Despite returning 10 starters on the offensive side of the ball, the Rams roster features 33 new faces entering the 2018 season.

Of the 33 new faces, 12 are on the offensive side of the ball, while 21 new defenders joined the Rams this offseason.

Offensively, four linemen, four wide receivers, two running backs, one tight end and one quarterback were added to the roster.

Defensively, the Rams added eight defensive backs, seven defensive linemen and six linebackers to their roster.

Defensively, all seven selections were used to bolster the Rams defensive front-seven.

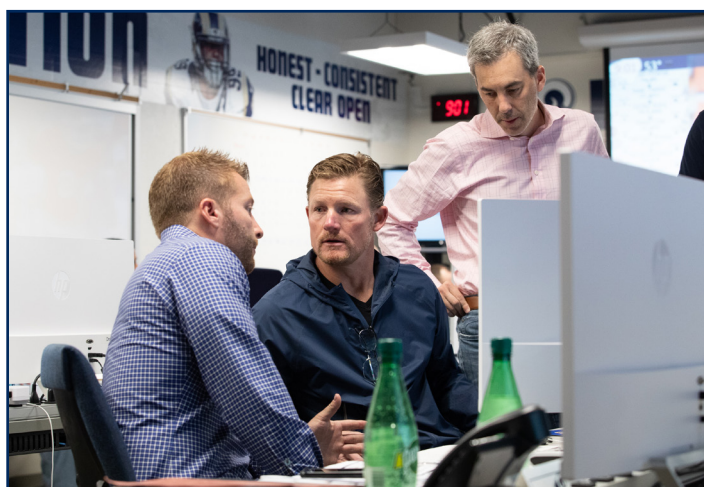

DOMINATING THE DIVISION

The Rams entered Week 17 with a two game lead in the NFC West and an 11-4 record when they decided to rest their starters against the 49ers. The Rams finished 4-2 against divisional opponents during the 2017 campaign.

After defeating the Seahawks at CenturyLink Field on Dec. 17, the Rams moved to 3-0 on the road against teams in the NFC West, the first time a Rams team has accomplished this feat since the 2001 Rams went 4-0 on the road in the then five team NFC West.

The Rams out scored their divisional opponents 171-112 this season, which is a 59 point differential. It is the highest positive point differential in the division for the Rams since the 2001 Rams outscored their divisional opponents 274-160 for a 114 point differential. The 2001 Rams played in a five team division and therefore had eight divisional games that season.

The Rams also posted 30-plus points against all three of their divisional opponents this season. The 2002 Rams were the last team to accomplish that feat.

Rams Head Coach Sean McVay immediately fixed the team's scoring issues, surpassing the 224 points scored in 2016 in only eight games in 2017. The Rams not only improved, they went from worst to first in total scoring and points per game from the 2016 to the 2017 season with 478 points scored and averaged 29.9 points per game.

The Rams scored 30-plus points nine times during the 2017 regular season, a feat the team achieved only three times in the previous two seasons combined.

NO FIRST, AND 10

The 2018 NFL Draft marked the 82nd draft for the Rams franchise dating back to the second-ever NFL draft in 1937. The team has not had a first-round selection in only nine of those drafts, most recently in 2018.

The season following a draft in which the team didn't make a selection in the first round, the Rams went on to win at least 10 games on five different occasions (1967, 1968, 1973, 1984, 2017), including three seasons where the Rams claimed the NFC West title (1967, 1973, 2017).

Additionally, five of the franchise's 21 ties have come the season following a draft that the Rams didn't make a first-round selection.

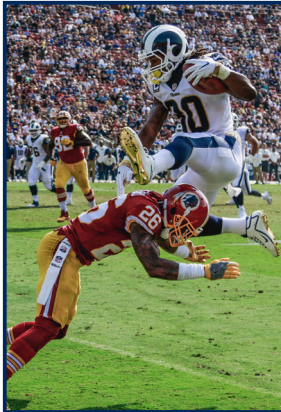

There were five Rams honored 10 times during the 2017 campaign with two NFC Special Teams Players of the Week, four NFC Offensive Players of the Week, one NFC Defensive Player of the Week, two NFC Offensive Players of the Month and two Special Teams Players of the Month.

RB Todd Gurley II was named the NFC Offensive Player of the Month for September this season. Gurley rushed 63 times for 241 yards and four rushing touchdowns and recorded 13 receptions for 140 yards and two touchdowns in the month of September. Gurley's six touchdowns led the NFC and were tied for first in the NFL in the

opening month of the 2017 season. A week after being named NFC Player of the Month for the first three games of the 2017 season, Gurley led the team in rushing (121 yards) and receiving (94 yards) to account for a then career-best 215 yards from scrimmage, earning a 35-30 win over the Cowboys and his first-career NFC Offensive Player of the Week accolades. Gurley was also named player of the week in Week 15. Gurley became the first RB to receive the weekly award back-to-back weeks since the award started in 1984.

K Greg Zuerlein booted his way into the Rams history books in the Week 4 win over Dallas with a 7-of-7 showing on field goal attempts, establishing a new franchise record for single-game made field goals and posting 23 points en route to his first NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors since the 2014 season. Zuerlein was named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Month for October 2017, his first-career player of the month accolades. Zuerlein continued his hot streak becoming the first player in NFL history to be named the NFC Special Teams Player of the month in back-to-back months.

WR/Returner Pharoh Cooper earned his first-career Player of the Week Accolades following the Week 6 win over Jacksonville, taking the opening kickoff 103 yards to pay dirt and tying a franchise record for longest kickoff return.

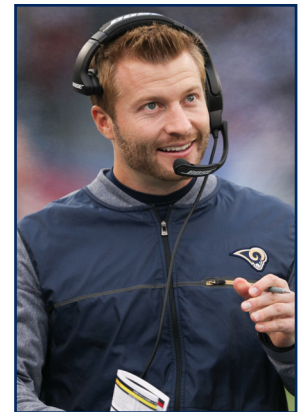

COACH 'EM UP

Rams Head Coach Sean McVay had one of the best seasons for a rookie head coach in franchise history.

McVay took over a team that was coming off of a 4-12 that ranked 32nd in scoring and helped transform it into the No. 1 scoring team in the league and helped secure the franchise's first NFC West title since 2003.

Due to his excellent first season and his instrumental part in revamping the Rams offense, McVay was chosen as the Associated Press Coach of the Year for 2017. He is the fourth head coach in franchise history to achieve this honor.

The last Rams head coach to win the award was Dick Vermeil in 1999. Vermeil helped guide the Rams to a 13-3 record, winning the NFC West and culminating with the franchise's lone Super Bowl victory over the Titans, 23-16, in Super Bowl XXXIV.

Chuck Knox was the only other rookie head coach in franchise history to win the award. He claimed the AP Coach of the Year honors in 1973 after leading the team to a 12-2 regular season record and division title in his first year as head coach.

The first Rams head coach to ever win the AP Coach of the Year was George Allen in 1967. Allen guided the Rams to an 11-1-2 record in his second year as head coach. Allen's Rams would eventually lose to the Green Bay Packers, 28-7, in the Divisional Round.

McVay became the youngest coach in NFL history to win the Associated Press Coach of the Year award. McVay was 31 years old during the team's final game of the season. Previously, Don Shula (34 years old) was the youngest coach to win the award.

RB Todd Gurley II recorded 276 scrimmage yards against the Titans on Dec. 24. Gurley's 276 scrimmage yards were the most in a single game in 2017. Gurley had 10 receptions for 158 yards and two touchdowns, including an 80-yard touchdown reception on a screen pass from QB Jared Goff. Gurley's 80-yard touchdown reception was the second longest of the season for a running back behind Dallas RB Rod Smith who scored on an 81-yard touchdown reception against the Giants on Dec. 10.

Gurley was the only player in the NFL last season to post 100-plus rushing yards and 100-plus receiving yards in a single game and first player since Houston RB Arian Foster rushed for 115 yards and had five receptions for 119 yards on Oct. 21, 2011.

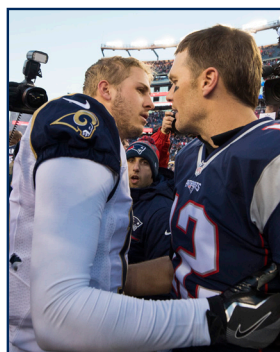

Rams QB Jared Goff was one of only two quarterbacks to start at least seven road games and have only two interceptions during the 2017 regular season.

Goff completed 148 passes for 1,848 yards, 18 touchdowns and two interceptions in eight road games this season. The Rams finished the season 7-1 in road games and 8-1 in games played away from the Coliseum in 2017.

Goff posted a 109.8 passer rating on the road with 18 touchdowns, second only to Kansas City QB Alex Smith, who played in only seven road games this season.

LINING THEM UP

One of Head Coach Sean McVay's first tasks was shoring up the Rams offensive line - a unit that saw six different starting combinations during the 2016 campaign. The Rams are the only team in the NFL to use the same five starting offensive linemen in 15 of their contests this season before resting starters during Week 17.

The Rams allowed only 28 sacks during the 2017 regular season, the ninth-fewest sacks allowed this past season. The Los Angeles Chargers allowed the fewest sacks during the 2017 regular season with 18. L.A. had two games last season in which they did not surrender a sack, both of which came on the road. The unit paved the way for RB Todd Gurley II to score a league-best 19 touchdowns and was the only player in the league to surpass over 2,000 scrimmage yards. Gurley averaged over 175 yard from scrimmage from Weeks 12-16.

The franchise had not used a draft pick on an offensive lineman from 2015 draft to the 2018 draft, so McVay and Co. infused the existing youth on the roster with a pair of veteran free agents in T Andrew Whitworth and C John Sullivan. The duo has combined to play in 324 career games with 288 starts. Additionally, Whitworth and Sullivan have played in 12 postseason contests with nine career playoff starts between them.

G Rodger Saffold was able to settle in at LG in 2017, a position he has started 39 games at in his 95 career starts. Saffold also has started at LT (38), RG (13) and RT (five).

T Rob Havenstein, a massive 6-8 lineman from Wisconsin, was the team's second round (57th overall) pick in 2015. Havenstein started the first 15 games of the 2016 season at RT before suffering an ankle injury. Havenstein started the first 15 games and Wild Card round of the 2017 season.

2015 third-round pick G Jamon Brown started five games in 2016 at both left and right guard positions. He won the RG position heading into the 2017 campaign a position he started all 16 regular season games and one playoff game at.

Rams WR Cooper Kupp was one of the best rookie wide receivers in the league in 2017. Kupp finished the regular season leading all rookies in first down receptions (42) and tied Pittsburgh's JuJu Smith-Schuster for the most 20-plus yard receptions (12). He finished second among rookies in receiving yards (869), tied for fourth in touchdown receptions (5) and fourth in receptions (62).

Despite not playing in Week 17, Kupp was one-of-six rookies a season ago to record multiple 40-plus yard receptions.

After enjoying a career-day in the team's opening win over the Indianapolis Colts to start the 2017 season, QB Jared Goff established a then career-high in passing yards (311), QB rating (146.8) and passing touchdowns (4) in a rain-soaked win over the New York Giants in the team's Week 9 win. A week later in the team's first game back in L.A. in over a month against, Goff posted a new-career high 355 yards passing.

Goff was one of only four quarterbacks to pass for over 300 yards with four passing touchdowns a season ago in the team's 51-17 win over the New York Giants.

In his first road start of his sophomore campaign, a Thursday Night game at San Francisco, the Cal product had his most efficient day in the NFL, completing 22-of-28 passing attempts (79 percent) for 292 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions with a 145.8 QB rating, earning his first road victory. It was Goff's second three-touchdown game, both games came on the road in his first road start of each of his first two seasons.

Rams QB Jared Goff threw three touchdowns in the first half of his first-career road start as a rookie in a Week 12 match-up with the New Orleans Saints in 2016, becoming the third rookie to throw three touchdowns in their first-career road start over the past 20 years.

The Los Angeles Rams lit up the scoreboard in a variety of different ways in 2017, as they led the league in scoring, finished tied for the third-best scoring differential and outscored opponents by 149 points during the 2017 regular season.

L.A. scored 53 points on its opening drives during the 2017 regular season, which is tied for the third-highest total in opening drive points. The Rams scored on 11 of their 16 opening drives, including five touchdowns.

The Rams had 188 offensive drives during the 2017 regular season and scored 45 touchdowns and connected on 40 field goals, scoring on 85-of-188 offensive drives (45.2 percent), which is the second-most efficient output in the league during the 2017 campaign trailing only the New England Patriots.

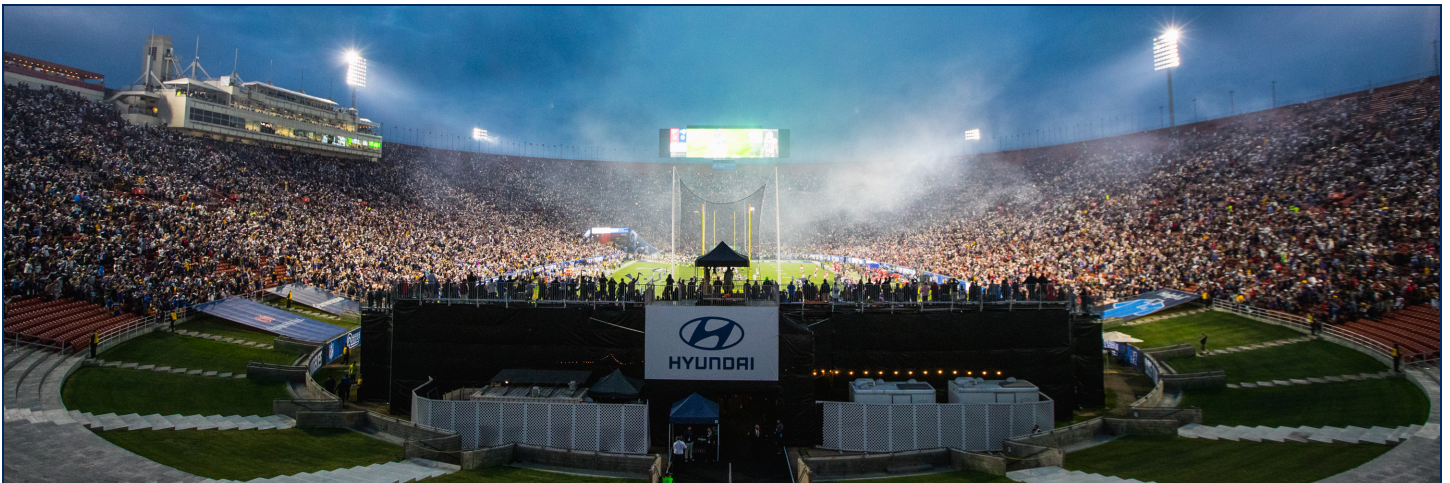
L.A. was also efficient in goal-to-go situations, converting 96.7 percent of their goal-to-go series into points. 33-of-188 offensive drives ended in goal-to-go situations and the Rams scored on 32 of those 33 drives for 198 points, the second-most goal-to-go points in the NFL in 2017.

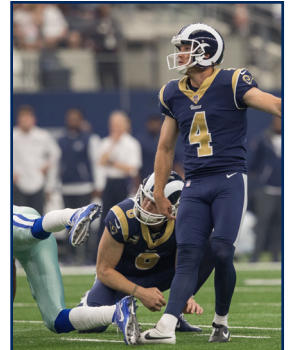
LET'S SCORE SOME MORE

RB Todd Gurley II finished 13th in the NFL in 2017 with 114 points scored, the highest total by a non-kicker.

FIRST TIME FOR A RAM

Rams DT Aaron Donald was named the Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year at NFL Honors on Feb. 3, 2018.

Donald is the first player in Rams history to ever earn the distinction of AP Defensive Player of the Year.

This past season, Donald racked up 52 tackles (31 solo), 11.0 sacks for 95 yards, five forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and two passes defended despite playing in only 14 games. Donald had team highs in sacks (11.0), quarterback hits (27) and forced fumbles (5).

Donald was named First Team All-Pro for the third-consecutive season and was selected for the Pro Bowl for the fourth-consecutive season. He tied his career-high in sacks this season with 11.0 and set new career highs in sack yardage (95) and forced fumbles (5).



PRESSURE UP THE MIDDLE

Donald was the best interior pass rusher in 2017. Last season, Donald ranked first in sacks (11.0) and sack yardage (95) among interior pass rushers.

He is the first defensive tackle since Cincinnati's Geno Atkins (11.0) and Carolina's Kawann Short (11.0) in 2015 to post 10-plus sacks in a single season. Since entering the league in 2014, Donald and Atkins are the only defensive tackles to post 10-plus sacks in multiple seasons.

Rams DT Aaron Donald tied his career high in sacks with 11.0 in 2017. However, Donald set a new career high in sack yardage (95) shattering his previous career high of 68 yards in 2014.

Donald's sacks this season were game changing. Three of his 11 sacks this season were for losses of 10-plus yards. Donald also set an NFL record for most sack yardage generated in a single game by an interior defensive lineman when he posted three sacks for 37 yards against Seattle in Week 15. That is the 11th most in a game in NFL history since sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

He finished the season ranked fourth in the NFL in sack yardage, despite finishing 11th in sacks. He also posted the sixth-highest sack yardage output among defensive tackles in a single season since sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

Both against the run and the pass, the Rams defense was among the NFL's best over the past three seasons when it came to making plays behind the line of scrimmage.

Since the start of the 2015 season, the L.A. Rams rank third in the league in opponents' negative plays, preventing 336 of the opponents plays from even reaching the line of scrimmage.

The Rams forced 91 negative plays during the 2017 regular season. The Cleveland Browns lead the league in total negative plays with 138 plays made behind their opponents' line of scrimmage.

The Rams defense forced 113 negative plays by opposing offenses in 2016, the third-most in the NFL this past season.

LB Mark Barron

LB Mark Barron recorded 135-plus tackles in back-to-back seasons in 2015-2016 and tallied 108 tackles in 2017 despite missing the three games during the regular season.

Barron finished second on the team during the 2017 regular season with 108 total tackles, including 80 solo stops which is the most on the team.

Barron tied for the most interceptions on the team with three interceptions last season. The former first-rounder has returned his three interception 29 yards.

In the team's Week 4 win at Dallas, the Alabama product posted his first interception of the season, intercepting QB Dak Prescott. Barron led the team in back-to-back weeks with 18 tackles against the Seahawks and 14 against the Jaguars.

Barron started all 16 contests of the 2016 campaign and finished second on the team with 147 tackles. He led or tied for the most tackles on the team in eight of the Rams' 2016 contests.

In the team's 2015 Week 7 win over Cleveland, Barron recorded a career-high 19 tackles, which is the most by any Ram in a game since 2001, and was close to matching it against the New Orleans Saints in the 2016 Week 12 match-up, finishing with 18 tackles.

In his career, Barron has recorded 41 TFL, 8.0 sacks, eight interceptions, forced four fumbles and added three fumble recoveries in 91 professional games as both a safety and a linebacker.

BROCKERS BRINGING IT

DT Michael Brockers started the 2017 with a seven-tackle performance against the Colts, the most on the team in Week 1.

During the 2017 regular season, Brockers led the Rams defensive line with 65 total tackles, the fifth-most on the team. The LSU product also added eight TFL, 4.5 sacks, eight QB hits and four PDs in 2017.

Since entering the league as a first round pick in 2012, Brockers has started 88-of 90 games played. Brockers is one of three defensive linemen this season to have multiple PDs in one game. No defensive lineman had multiple PDs until Week 4.

In 2016, he recorded the second-most tackles on the team by an interior defensive lineman (58) during the 2016 season. His 58 total tackles ranked eighth on the team a season ago. In 2016, the LSU product tallied seven quarterback pressures and four quarterback hits despite missing two games in the middle of the season.

Brockers finished the 2015 season with career highs in tackles (74) and tackles for loss (12). His tackle for loss total tied for third among all Rams.

Brockers has posted 36 TFL, 39 QB hits, 19.0 sacks, seven PDs, forced two fumbles and recovered one fumble appearing in 89 games with 89 starts in his first six seasons in the National Football League.

Rams defenders forcing a fumble

Defensive Coordinator Wade Phillips continues to build defenses predicated on forcing turnovers. The Rams defense forced 17 fumbles during Phillips' first season as defensive coordinator. The 17 forced fumbles were tied for the most in the league a season ago with the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Phillips Broncos defensive unit forced 34 fumbles in his two seasons as coordinator, tied for the fourth-best total in those two seasons.

As a team, the Rams have forced 90 fumbles since 2012. The 90 forced fumbles is the third-best total in the NFL during that span.

Rams DT Aaron Donald has used an explosive first step to make a living in opponents' backfields since entering the league in 2014.

Since the start of the 2014 season, Donald leads the league lead in tackles for loss, tallying 72 in 62 games played, including 15 TFL in 14 games during the 2017 season.

The 15 TFL is tied for the ninth-most this season and the most by an interior defensive lineman.

Donald recorded a career-high 22 tackles for loss in his second season in the NFL in 2015.

KICKING WITH EFFICIENCY

Rams K Greg Zuerlein had one of the best years of his career and posted some of the best numbers among kickers before being placed on injured reserve, ending his 2017 campaign.

Zuerlein finished tied for third in the NFL with a 95.0 percent conversion rate. Out of his 40 field goal attempts he only missed two, one Week 5 against Seattle, the other was an attempt at a career-long 63-yard field goal as time expired in the first half of a Week 12 game against the New Orleans Saints.

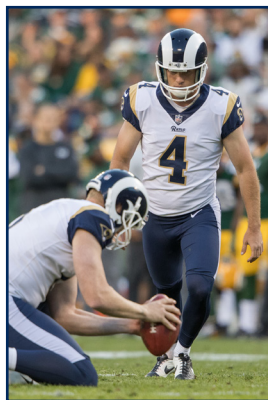

A LEG UP IN THE SCORING COLUMN

Against Buffalo in the Rams' 2016 Week 5 contest, K Greg Zuerlein made his 100th career field goal. He now has connected on 150 field goals and 187 PATs in his five-year NFL career.

Against the Cowboys in the 2017 Week 4 contest, Zuerlein booted the Rams to their third win of the season, accounting for 23 of the team's 35 points, connecting on 7-of-7 field goal attempts and 2-of-2 PATs. The seven made field goals established a franchise record for single-game field goals and his 23 points is the second-highest total for a Ram in a single game. Zuerlein ties Billy Cundiff for the third-most points by a kicker in a single game in NFL history, falling three points short of Rob Bironas' 26-point effort on 10/21/07. On the season, Zuerlein is 36-of-38 on field goal attempts and 35-of-36 on PATs.

Zuerlein's 97.4 percent PAT success rate is the fourth-highest percentage in franchise history. Zuerlein is the only kicker in franchise history that has kicked PATs from the 2-yard line and the 15-yard line.

In his career, Zuerlein has scored 637 points and connected on 150-of-181 FG attempts and 187-of-192 PATs.

Zuerlein ranks third in franchise history with 637 career points, and posted a personal-best 158 points, which was the most points by anyone during the 2017 regular season.



SPECIAL, SPECIAL TEAMS



The Rams were one-of-five teams in the NFL to block a punt during the 2017 season and they are the only team with multiple blocked punts, marking the 12th season in which a Rams team has blocked multiple punts in a single season. They are the first team to do so in franchise history since the 2003 Rams.

The 2017 Rams are the first team to block multiple punts and return them for touchdowns since 2014 when the Philadelphia Eagles (three) and Minnesota Vikings (two) achieved the feat. On the season, L.A. has blocked three punts, one PAT and one field goal.

Rams OLB Cory Littleton is the first player to block multiple punts in a single season since 2014 when Philadelphia's Jurrell Casey and Buffalo's Anthony Dixon each had two blocks.

After taking over punt return duties for the Rams in Week 5 of last season, Pharoh Cooper proved to be one of the most dynamic all around returners in the league.

The former Gamecock finished second in punt return average in addition to second in kickoff return average and leads the league in total return yards.

Cooper has returned 30 punts for 393 yards and a 53-yard long.

GREG THE LEG

Rams K Greg "The Leg" Zuerlein is one of the most prolific long-distance kickers in NFL history.

At Minnesota (11/8/15), he broke his own team record with a 61-yard field goal. In the process, he became just the second kicker in NFL history to make two 60 yard field goals in a career, joining Sebastian Janikowski. Coincidentally, Rams Special Teams Coordinator John Fassel held the same position with the Raiders when Janikowski accomplished his feat.

Zuerlein owns five of the six longest field goals made in Rams history, and his 61-yard kick in Minnesota was the longest in the NFL during the 2015 season.

Zuerlein has been one of the best deep ball kickers in the league since he arrived in 2012. At Washington (9/20/15), Zuerlein made a 52-yard kick. With 24 career kicks from 50 yards or more, Zuerlein ranks second in team history in field goals of 50 yards or more. He passed Josh Brown last season to move into second on the Rams all-time scoring list. He's tied for the third-most 50-yard field goals in the NFL since 2012.

WR Pharoh Cooper recorded the first kickoff returned for a touchdown for the Rams since the 2006 season when he took the opening kickoff against the Jaguars 103 yards for the score.

Cooper led the NFL in kickoff return average (27.4) among those with at least 1.25 returns per game during the 2017 regular season.

The South Carolina product has been the best overall returner in the NFL this season. Cooper leads the league in total return yards with 1,331 and second in kickoff return yards with 932. He is also second in punt return average returning each punt an average 12.5 yards. Cooper was named to his first-career Pro Bowl as a returner.

JOHNNY ON THE SPOT

P Johnny Hekker posted the third-best net average in NFL history with a 44.3 net average during the 2017 regular season, the second-best average of Hekker's career. Tennessee punter Brett Kern led the league in 2017 with a 44.6 yard net average.

Hekker enjoyed a record-breaking 2016 season, recording the most punts downed inside opponents' 20-yard line in NFL history. Additionally, Hekker broke his own NFL single-season net punting average record (46.0).

Hekker booted a then career-long 75 yard punt against the Carolina Panthers in the Rams' 2016 Week 9 contest, and bested himself a week later with a 78-yarder against the New York Jets.

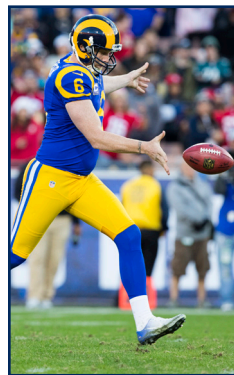
The Oregon State product finished the 2016 season with 98 punts, a 47.8 yard gross punting average, 51 punts inside opponents 20-yard line with only one touchback. As a unit, the Rams punt coverage team limited opponents to 152 return yards on 35 attempts and limited opponents to a league-best 4.3 yard average. With the outstanding coverage unit and directional punting, Hekker posted a 46.0-yard net average on the season, the best in NFL history.

Hekker led the NFL in 2015 in net average (43.7), gross average (47.9) and punts downed inside the opponents' 20 yard-line (41). Since the NFL began tracking punts inside 20 yard-line in 1976, Hekker is the first player to lead the league in gross, net and punts placed inside the 20-yard line in the same season.

P Johnny Hekker pinned 46.15 percent of his punts in 2017 inside the 20 yard line, the third-best mark in the NFL.

Of Hekker's 65 punts, he pinned 30 inside the 20-yard line with only four touchbacks.

Opponents only posted 152 punt return yards against the Rams this season, the fifth-fewest yards in the NFL a season again.

This season, Hekker punted 65 times covering 3,113 yards for a 47.9 yard average and a net average of 44.3 yards, which is the second-best net average in the league this season.

Hekker's 65 punts finished tied for the 25th-most this season among punters that appeared in every game.

FLIPPING FIELDS

P Johnny Hekker continues to be not only one of the most accurate punters in the NFL, but has developed into a complete special teams weapon at flipping the field.

Hekker became the first punter in the NFL to record a 75-plus yard punt in back-to-back games since Patriots' P Luke Prestridge in 1984.

The Oregon State product established a career-long 75-yard punt in the team's 2016 Week 9 contest against the Carolina Panthers, a record that stuck for a week before he booted a 78-yarder against the New York Jets in the Rams' Week 10 contest. On the season, Hekker has three punts over 75 yards.

There were only nine 70-plus yard punts during the 2016 NFL campaign, Hekker and Jaguars' Brad Norton each had a 78-yarder to their name. There has not been one 70-yard punt through the first three weeks of the 2017 season.

Hekker's 46.0-yard net average led the league in 2016, and ranks first in NFL history for a single season. Previously, the 16-game record was 44.2, a record Hekker himself set in 2013

Since the NFL went to a 16-game season in 1978, the lowest opponent punt return average, with a minimum of 25 returns, is 2.6 yards, set by the Rams in 2013. The 2016 version of the Rams saw its opponents return 35 punts for just a 4.3 yards per return average.

ONE 'HEK' OF A RECORD

P Johnny Hekker went on a 13-game streak without a touchback, the longest of his career. He had previously posted two separate nine-game streaks without a touchback.

In the team's 2016 Week 16 game against the San Francisco 49ers, P Johnny Hekker recorded four punts inside the 20-yard line, moving him in to sole possession of the single-season record with 51 punts downed inside opponents' 20-yard line. The punts downed inside the 20 aided his 46.0 net yard average, the best in league history.

The record was previously held by Arizona Punter Dave Zastudil, who amassed 46 punts inside opponents territory during the 2012 season. Zastudil needed 112 punting attempts to reach the record and also recorded eight touchbacks. Hekker reached 51 punts inside the 20 with 98 punting attempts and only committed one touchback during the 2016 season. Hekker punted a career-high 98 times in 2016.

The Rams special teams units have flourished since Special Teams Coordinator John Fassel took over prior to the 2012 season. During the 2017 regular season, the Rams opponents have averaged 6.1 yards per return, the ninth-best mark in the league, while P Johnny Hekker's 44.3 net yard average is the second-best total this season.

Hekker and the Rams coverage units have backed opponents up deep in their own territory and limited opponents to average just 6.4 yards per punt return, which is the lowest average in the NFL since the start of the 2012 season.
